

\$750,000 to create the Person-Centered Triage Approach National Collaborative, incorporating the ADR bedrock principle of party self-determination, to transform mental health crisis response in 911/988 centers. MMHPI recently announced that this pilot project would be launched in Cleveland, Ohio, with University Hospitals (UH), Chagrin Valley Dispatch, and Geauga County Sheriff's Office, among others. The project trains dispatchers in Geauga County and the Chagrin Valley to ask a series of questions to 911 callers. The questions are designed to help dispatchers quickly determine if the call involves a mental






